the Image: Architecture, the City and the Politics of Representation (2015) and the co-edited volumes The Place of Silence: Architecture / Media / Philosophy (2019) and Seeing From Above: The Aerial View in Visual Culture (2013). Dorrian has held awards from various bodies, including the British Academy, the Graham Foundation, the Canadian Centre for Architecture, and the Monument Trust-the latter to support a period of study in the Department of Prints & Drawings of The British Museum.

ANDREW DOUGLAS is a

senior lecturer in theory and design in the School of Architecture and Planning at the University of Auckland. He is an executive editor of Interstices: Journal of Architecture and Related Arts. He currently chairs the enigma: he aupiki Trust, and is a trustee on the Greg Bowron Memorial Trust. He has practiced architecture in both Auckland and London and completed postgraduate studies at the University of Auckland and Goldsmiths, University of London. His research ranges across fields associated with urban and Greek philosophy and history, aspects of Continental philosophy-particularly the work of Gilles Deleuze and Felix Guattari-critical perspectives on socio-spatial practice, and gender and sexuality as these pertain to literature, cinema and the urban imaginary. His doctoral research investigated observation and reflectivity in modernity via accounts of walking in European contexts since the seventeenth century. His current research addresses the role of affect in emerging forms of publicness and governance, colonial-urban

formations in Aotearoa New Zealand, and philosophies of image and imagination.
